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## A Message from the the Chief Executive Officer

People in our community and all over the world partner with Habitat for Humanity to build or improve a place they can call home. Habitat homeowners help build their own homes alongside volunteers and pay an affordable mortgage. With our help, Habitat homeowners achieve the strength, stability and self-reliance they need to build a better life for themselves and their families.

Since its founding in 1976, Habitat for Humanity has built or renovated 600,000 homes in 100 countries around the globe, including more than 2,700 in Canada. Habitat for Humanity Ontario Gateway North has already partnered with 45 hard-working local families, allowing them to contribute to the community as homeowners when a conventional mortgage was out of their reach. We'll soon partner with many more.

The overall trend of serving families has increased since the first of our local chapters formed in 1995 and growth remains our goal. Despite the many challenges presented to the organization during the year, Habitat for Humanity Ontario Gateway North (HFHOGN) continued to develop steadily throughout 2017. We take this opportunity to recognize the hard work of the affiliate and chapter staff and volunteers that resulted in the completion of two semi-detached homes, which combined to provide safe and affordable housing for four hard working, low-income families in Espanola and Huntsville.

In this annual report, we pay tribute to the efforts of Tom Phillips who stepped across from the Board of Directors to act as Interim CEO for the majority of the year. In so doing, Tom began the important process of

rationalizing organizational finances whilst also planning and overseeing the re-location of the ReStores in Midland, Huntsville and Sudbury. The Bracebridge ReStore will also be relocated, in addition to the Affiliate HQ, all scheduled for 2018. It was a very busy year indeed!

We extend our gratitude to the numereous corporate sponsors and partners, old and new, who continue to support our mission. Of particular note was the donation of \$50,000 from Walker Industries, which set a new benchmark for our fundraising efforts in support of the ongoing build in Orillia.



#### Why affordable homeownership?

We know that affordable homeownership plays an absolutely critical role in helping families create a new foundation for a stronger future, one that's filled with possibilities and progress. Affordable homeownership allows families to foster the skills and confidence they need to invest in themselves and their communities, which has a life-changing impact on their lives.

The benefits of a Habitat home reach far beyond the four walls. Habitat families enjoy better health, education and employment prospects, and are less reliant on social services. In total, every Habitat home built helps create \$175,000 worth of benefits for society.

# The Need For Affordable Housing

Everyone in Canada has the right to a safe, decent and affordable place to live – yet so many families do not. With the support of our donors, sponsors and volunteers, Canadians can help build a more caring nation – where neighbours build homes that provide the foundation for a better life.

The need for affordable housing is at an all-time high. In fact, 1 in 7 Canadian households, including 735,000 children, do not have a safe, decent, affordable place to call home. Many families live month to month, finding it nearly impossible to pay for their basic necessities. Families are often forced to decide between paying for food or paying their rent – a choice that no family should have to make.

At Habitat, we know that when families own their homes, they have ownership over their futures. We also know that communities thrive when families have access to affordable homeownership, meaning supporter dollars make a lasting, compounding impact.

For example, research shows that in Canada every \$1 invested in Habitat yields about \$4 of social benefits. For every family who partners with Habitat, this equates to \$175,000 worth of social benefits, over a 25-year period, through happier and healthier families, improved employment and education opportunities, and a decreased burden on social programming.

Homeownership allows families to move out of social housing, freeing up spaces for those on waiting lists. Research reveals that after becoming Habitat homeowners, reliance on social assistance and food banks decreases. Children of Habitat homeowners have lower high school dropout rates, and many more earn a bachelor's degree or higher compared to a control group. Families are also more likely to donate time and money to charities. What is clear is that when families own their own home – and gain strength, stability and self-reliance

- they can focus on their health, education and quality of life.

## **Build Days**

Habitat for Humanity Ontario Gateway North's team building opportunities offer organizations a chance to invest in their employees while making a real difference in the lives of hard-working families and the communities in which they live.

Just like future Habitat homeowners do prior to purchasing their Habitat home, team members come together on a Habitat build site, roll up their sleeves and work together to help build a safe, decent, and affordable place that a family in need will one day call home. Habitat's team building opportunities are an experience like no other. Employees of all skill levels – beginner to professional – will learn useful skills as they work side by side in a safe environment under the leadership of experienced Habitat crew leaders. While the work will be challenging, it will also be rewarding. Together, teams have fun, connect with their fellow colleagues in a truly meaningful way, and leave the build site proud of their accomplishments, their colleagues, and their organization.



#### **Dockside Publishing**

On February 23<sup>rd</sup>, volunteers from Dockside Publishing fitted insulation and installed vapor barrier at the Habitat build site in Huntsville. The team raised \$2,500 for the opportunity to build and give back to their community by working at the Habitat buildsite.

Ten volunteers from Eacom Timber Corp. joined us on July 10<sup>th</sup>, during Carter Work Week in Espanola. The group assisted with drilling post holes, cutting wood and installing the fence around the yard of the semi-detached homes.

#### **A Change of View**

The Habitat for Humanity ReStore sells quality, new and used furniture, appliances and building materials to the public at greatly reduced prices. All products are donated by local people or businesses, keeping reuseable items from landfills. ReStore proceeds help cover Habitat Ontario Gateway North's administration costs, ensuring that donations go directly to the construction of affordable homes for families in need.

As part of overall operational strategy to invest in change, the decision to relocate ReStores as their existing lease terms expired created a year full of change! The Sudbury and Huntsville ReStore both began searching for new space in early 2017. The Sudbury ReStore opened in their new 11,500 square foot location in October 2017 with their official grand opening celebration held in January 2018. The Huntsville ReStore was the first ReStore to open in a shopping mall. The 12,000 square foot retail space is a former Zellers, renovated to suit the ReStore operation.

In the fall of 2017, the opportunity arose to sell the owned building of the Midland ReStore. As this opportunity arose, a new location of 8,300 square feet was quickly renovated in November 2017 and opened as the Midland ReStore in December 2017.

Although the Bracebridge ReStore lease was not due to expire until March 2018, a new location directly in Bracebridge, also part of an old Zellers building was secured at the end of 2017. The move will take place in March 2018. Although the size of the new store is 12,500 square feet, compared to the existing 22,000 square feet, the improved location and visibility for donors and customers will be an exciting change we are looking forward to.

By April 2018, all five of Ontario Gateway North's ReStores will have located into new retail spaces. The increased visibility and profile of each of the ReStores is anticipated to result in huge support from the community, customers and donors alike. The investment in ReStore re-location and capacity was made to contribute to helping more families each year across our communities.





#### **Accreditation**

In 2017, Habitat for Humanity Ontario Gateway North pursued accreditation through the Imagine Canada Standards Program. An initial application submitted for peer review in September will be returned and finalized in 2018 in hopes of achieving full accreditation. The investment of pursuing the Imagine Canada Accreditation speaks to the organizational goals of achieving trust and recognition across our region.

The Standards Program awards accreditation to charities and nonprofits that demonstrate compliance in five fundamental areas: board governance; financial accountability and transparency; fundraising; staff management; and volunteer involvement. The goals of the Program are to increase organizational transparency in these areas and to strengthen public confidence in individual organizations and the sector as a whole.


#### **Organizational Chart**


